Does the current subject content for GCSE English give schools and students what they need?

Over 800 secondary English teachers told us their honest thoughts. Their answers suggest that it's time for **urgent reform in GCSE English**.

Let's talk teaching



Only **a fifth**

of all secondary English teachers say their current GCSE English specification is **enjoyable to teach**.

- More than half (53%) say it focuses on the wrong things.
- Just 1 in 10 say it includes enough diverse texts and authors.
- **54%** say it is **not accessible or inclusive**.

Let's talk **skills**



68%

of secondary English teachers say current English GCSE assessments **don't capture students' skills**.

- Just 1 in 20 say it fosters creativity.
- Only 7% say it builds confidence in speaking and listening.

Let's talk **students' futures**



Over half

(53%) of all secondary English teachers say GCSE English doesn't prepare students for post-16 study.

- 45% say their specification doesn't provide skills for work...
 - ... a figure that rises to 55% in the most disadvantaged schools.
- 0% say it prepares students for a digital future.

Teachers have spoken. Their words point to a clear **need to revive GCSE English** to make it the **engaging**, **innovative and inclusive subject it truly can be**.

Together, we can turn around the fortunes of the subject we all love.
