1. What is your name and what course are you studying?

My name is Kelly Davies and I'm in my final year of university studying Spanish and Portuguese.

2. What languages do you speak?

I'm a native English speaker. I speak Spanish and Portuguese, and a little bit of Catalan.

3. When did you decide to learn another language and why?

Originally, I had to choose a language to study at school. I later chose to continue studying Spanish as it was something that I enjoyed and when I started looking at university courses, I was interested in the options of Portuguese and Catalan as additional languages. I hadn't considered picking up a new language from scratch, but I found Portuguese interesting because of its similarities (and differences!) to Spanish. Through learning Spanish, I had become interested in other languages in Spain such

Learning and speaking another language definitely helps you to connect with people who are learning English as a second language, and to understand the challenges of learning a language later in life. I find that you make much stronger connections with people when you can speak to them in their native language, or at least try to speak to them. When I've travelled to other countries. I've found that people appreciate the effort of trying to speak another language and are always keen to help you improve.
