Because he had the chance to see his enemies coming and was able to run away (Or similar appropriate answer)	1	Answer that shows the child hasn't understood why this event is significant	Think about what would have happened if the prince hadn't woken up then. Would his enemies have found him?

No. A spider and fly helped him to escape from his enemies, so the prince has likely changed his mind about them. (Or similar appropriate answer)	1	An answer that doesn't reflect the fact that the prince's views on spiders and flies are likely to have changed	How did the prince feel about spiders and flies at the start of the story? How did a fly and a spider help him? Do you think this might stop the prince moaning about spiders and flies?
