The week in a nutshell

Rising coronavirus cases drove headlines in the education this week. Calls for England to follow Wales in moving classes online before the Christmas holidays led to the Department for Education threatening legal action against Greenwich Borough Council. This after the council wrote to head teachers asking to move teaching online. To counter the rising rates of coronavirus in schools the Government has announced that from January, **every secondary school and college in England will have access to rapid coronavirus tests** following a pilot. We also had the publication of **data from Ofqual which showed that the number of grades changed following an appeal for GCSEs awarded in the summer rose by 900% this year**. We also saw the Northern Ireland Education Minister again make clear that exams will go ahead and in **Wales** further detail on how general qualifications will be assessed. And, finally, the Office for Students published new analysis showing an **increase in the proportion of BAME students entering higher tariff universities between 2013-14 and 2018-19**.

Top story

From January, every secondary school and college in England, including special schools, will have access to rapid coronavirus tests, following the success of recent pilot schemes, the Government has announced.

- Staff in secondary schools will be eligible for weekly tests, and students will be eligible for daily testing for seven days if they come into contact with someone who has tested positive.
- From January, those in the same bubble do **not** need to self-isolate if they agree to daily testing.
- Primary schools will be supported to roll out testing as quickly as possible over the spring term.

The number of grades changed following an appeal for GCSEs awarded in the summer 2020 rose by 900%.

- The total number of appeals for GCSE rose from 2,182 last year to 27,825 this year; marking a 1175% increase. Analysis from Ofqual also showed a 620% increase in changed A Level grades from 197 to 1,420 at the end of the 2019/20 academic year.

The OfS has published an analysis of rates in HE between students from different ethnic groups. The report found that there was an increase in the proportion of BAME students entering higher tariff universities between 2013-14 and 2018-19. This is consistent with data from the DfE.

- There was a higher proportion of Asian, white and mixed ethnicity students at higher tariff universities compared with other providers, but only 5.3 per cent of entrants to these universities were black.
- Regardless of their ethnicity, students at higher tariff universities were most likely to continue with their courses. In 2017-18 the continuation rate for white students at higher tariff providers was 96.1%. Black students at non-higher tariff universities had the lowest continuation rates of any ethnic group in the same time period at 83%.
