Our **Power of Maths Stat-Shot series** highlights headline insights into different aspects of maths education based on the views of over 2,000 primary teachers and secondary maths teachers who took part in our Teacher Tapp survey in the 2020/21 academic year.

Here's what teachers told us about maths confidence among pupils, staff and parents...

Student confidence



We asked teachers in the autumn term about the impact of COVID-19 on their maths learners' confidence and how they were supporting it.



Two in five (44%) maths teachers said their students have reduced maths confidence following COVID-19.



Just under a quarter (22%)

of secondary maths teachers and 13% of primary maths teachers



had seen an increase in students suffering from maths anxiety over the pandemic.



Three-quarters (75%) of maths teachers are confident that they can identify and support learners with maths anxiety.



Two in five (40%) have been putting greater focus on building maths confidence among their students since COVID-19.

Teacher confidence



As you'd expect, on the whole teachers are very confident in their own maths skills and ability to teach the subject.

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Almost all (97%) maths teachers are confident using and teaching maths.



Confidence grows with age...
58% of maths teachers in their
20s are 'very confident' using
and teaching maths, 68% aged
over 50 say the same.

Seven in 10 (71%) are confident using their maths skills to support them in their everyday lives.





A third (32%) still think more CPD and training to support their maths teaching would help them to better inspire their pupils with the power of maths.



Looking beyond the school gates, we asked teachers for their view on maths confidence levels among parents and carers.




Nine out of 10 (90%) maths

teachers hear phrases such as "I'm not a maths person" or "I was never very good at maths" often or all of the time from parents and carers.

Fewer than half (44%) of maths **teachers** are confident in their ability to support parents and carers to feel more positive about maths.



The Pearson Power of Maths survey was carried out on 2,125 primary teachers and secondary maths teachers in October 2020 by polling organisation Teacher Tapp.
