 Canadian Coins-Did You Know?| Toonie (2 dollars) <br> - replaced paper \$2 bill in 1996 <br> - a two-colour coin <br> - picture of polar bear <br> - issued special toonie in 2008 to recognize the 400th anniversary of Quebec City | Loonie (1 dollar) <br> - replaced paper \$1 bill in 1987 <br> - picture of a loon, the national bird of Canada <br> - issued special loonie in 2005 to honour Terry Fox | Quarter ( 25 cents) <br> - worth one quarter of a dollar <br> - picture of a caribou, one of Canada's most recognizable animals <br> - issued poppy quarter in 2004 in honour of Remembrance Day |

| Dime (10 cents) <br> - smallest coin by size <br> - has picture of a famous Canadian sailboat, the Bluenose <br> - issued special dime in 2001 to honour the millions of Canadians who volunteer to help others | Nickel (5 cents) <br> - was originally made from nickel <br> - has picture of a beaver, an official symbol of Canada <br> - issued Victory nickel in 2005 to remember 60 years since end of World War II | Penny (1 cent) <br> - stopped being used in 2013 <br> - cost more than 1 cent to make <br> - picture of maple leaves <br> - until 1996, the penny had 12 sides so it was easier for people with vision problems to identify it |
