## What are Special Objects?

For thousands of years, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples have been making objects using **fauna** and **flora** as well as other natural materials such as stone, shell and water. They have made many different kinds of objects to suit their environment, lifestyle, and their personal tastes.

These objects include tools used for everyday survival, such as digging sticks, spears or grinding stones. They also include body decoration, such as necklaces or armbands, and clothes, such as grass skirts or skin cloaks. Other objects are used for play, storytelling activities and special events.
